

## Can I Venmo someone \$4000? One more practical

Good news on this one — \$4,000 is very doable on [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] Venmo, as long as a couple of boxes are checked first. The main gatekeeper is identity verification. Once you've verified your identity with [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] Venmo, your weekly sending limit jumps to as much as \$60,000, comfortably covering a \$4,000 payment, whereas an unverified account is stuck at a [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] tiny fraction of that amount and simply won't let a transfer this size through, no matter how much money is sitting in your balance. So before anything else [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US], pop into Settings > Identity Verification in the app and confirm you're fully verified; if you're not, that's step one, and it usually only takes a few minutes plus a photo of your ID. If you're already verified, the next thing to think [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] about is how much of your weekly limit you've already used. Venmo runs on a rolling seven-day window rather than a simple calendar reset, so a [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] payment counts against your cap for a full week from the moment you send it, then gradually falls off, not all at once on a set day. That means if you've sent [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] other large payments recently, part of your capacity might still be tied up, even if it feels like it should have "reset" already. Rates

One more practical note: sending \$4,000 in [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] a single transaction is fine limit-wise, but it's still worth doing a quick gut-check on the recipient, especially for an amount this size. Venmo payments to [US] 1—888—590—9448 [US] people you don't know well aren't reversible the way a bank transfer dispute might be, so double-check the username and profile photo before you hit send.
